In January, we will have another wonderful Petite Antiques Forum which will include a tour of Bonnie Glen, one of the oldest homes in Pointe Coupee Parish.

On January 30, 2025, the twenty-fifth Friends of Magnolia Mound Petite Antiques Forum will feature a lecture by Laura Pass Barry. The Juli Grainger Curator of Paintings, Drawings and Sculpture at Colonial Williamsburg will speak about "American Folk Art at Colonial Williamsburg."



When Mrs. John D. Rockefeller, Jr. began Abby Aldrich Rockefeller acquiring naive art in the late 1920s there were few other serious collectors. This was a time when not many people acknowledged that the portraits, weathervanes, theorem paintings, and figural trade signs created by nonacademic or folk artists were anything more than quaint or curious objects, with perhaps some historical interest. Mrs. Barry will share with the audience the extraordinary collection of the Abby Aldrich Rockefeller Folk Art Museum, America's first folk art museum, as well as pieces from the DeWitt Wallace Decorative Arts Museum.

Following the lecture in the Louisiana State Archives Building, attendees will lunch at the Baton Rouge Country Club.

After luncheon participants will drive to Pointe Coupee Parish to tour a private home not often open to the public. Bonnie Glen was built circa 1830. The property has been owned by the same family since 1805, and the current owners David and Jeanne Curet James are the eighth generation to enjoy it. We thank Mr. and Mrs. James for allowing our guests to tour their home and grounds.

Invitations will be mailed to members in December. Seating is limited and advance registration is required. Please plan to attend the twenty fifth Petite Antiques Forum. It will be the first major event in 2025, which will mark the fiftieth anniversary of the opening of a restored Magnolia Mound to the public. Proceeds raised by the forum will be used

We had a fantastic Second Annual Pumpkin Patch event. The weather was perfect, and we sold out of all our pumpkins in less than two hours. We're already working hard to have even more for next year and have begun planting our cover crops, as shown in the picture.

As you can see, we've planted cover crops like clover, yellow mustard, brassicas, Austrian Winter Pea, a grain pea mix, and canola seed. These crops will not only improve the soil over the winter but also provide foraging resources for our bees. We'd like to thank Kevin Langley for his assistance with this project and with the bees.

Speaking of bees, we sold quite a bit of honey with our new label design, provided by Covalent Logic and printed by Vivid Ink. We love the new design, and many of our participants did too. We still have some available in the Magnolia Mound gift shop if you're interested.

One big surprise for us was the interest in our sugar cane this year. People were not only interested in tasting the cane but also in buying it to take home and plant, as well as chewing on it. We currently have four different varieties provided by the LSU Sugar Research Station: Magnolia Mound Cane and three heirloom varieties: Cuban, Thailand, and LA Stripe, which is a purple and gold striped variety.

We'll be selling sugar cane, honey, and our organic spices at the Creole Christmas event at Magnolia Mound Plantation on December 15, from Noon to 5 pm. Come join us for some fun and enjoy our kitchen garden, which is thriving this year and can provide inspiration for your future gardens.

2025-Fiftieth Anniversary of Magnolia Mound as Museum

n 2016, Magnolia Mound celebrated the 50th anniversary of the rescue of Magnolia Mound in 1966. This coming year, nine years later, marks

the 50th anniversary of the opening of the Historic House Museum in 1975. Many may recall we opened with only one piece of furniture—the outstanding New Orleans armoire from the estate of *State-Times* editor, Maggie Dixon. From that day, the decorative arts collection has slowly grown to compliment the educational story of Magnolia Mound's history.

For 2025, there will be a special "gold seal" on all programs and we're planning now for several special events to commemorate the opening of the museum. On April 11, we'll be hosting a luncheon in the barn in honor of the 200th anniversary of the visit of the Marquis de Lafayette to Baton Rouge.

In the planning stages now, a special exhibition of art featuring Magnolia Mound, from local artists, some in our collection and others on loan. We hope to include area schools with their own art projects and their personal interpretations of Magnolia Mound.

Collection Corner

he Friends recently added several pieces to its permanent collection. Among them is an early American pressed glass spooner, flint glass, Hamilton pattern, circa 1860s – 1870s. It will be displayed

in the overseer's house.

It was not until the 19th century that glassmakers learned how to shape glass by mechanically pressing molten glass into a mold. Hand-pressed glass has existed for over 1,000 years, but the use

glass has existed for over 1,000 years, but the use of a machine for pressing was new.

Benjamin Bakewell of Pittsburgh founded his enterprise in 1808 which had a vital role in establishing Pittsburgh as a major center of glassmaking in the nineteenth century.

In 1825, John Palmer Bakewell patented a machine to make furniture knobs. In 1827, he joined the Bakewell firm. Items with intricate patterns and designs were now affordable through pressed glass manufacturing and became a staple in households.

The process began with the preparation of a cast iron mold. The design was precisely crafted into a mold. The accuracy of the mold was important to reproduce the desired pattern, serving as the foundation for the entire fabrication.

Once the mold was created, the glassmaker could start the press by melting the raw materials. The molten glass was carefully poured into the mold. This step required precision to allow the glass to fill the intricate details of the mold. The correct amount of glass was extremely important as not enough or too much would create problems with the result. The melted glass was mechanically pressed into the mold with the use of a plunger. The plunger was lowered from above and pressed into the mold, pressing glass into all the indentations of the design on the mold.

Pressed glass objects are recognizable by their mold joint marks. These lines can be found on the sides of the pieces where the mold would have fitted together.
